## **God Simply Loves**

By Mary Katharine Deeley

We nod our heads when asked whether God loves us, but what would you say if you were asked, "Does God like you?"

God's love is often difficult to fathom. Some of us are rational: "God loves everyone"—the unspoken thought being, "It's his job to love me." We say this about parents as well: "She's my mom, she has to say that." This idea of God's love never moves further than the head. Other people compartmentalize the love: "God loves me, but only when I'm good," or "God loves only the good parts of me." Still others use God's love as a shield against responsibility: "God forgives me no matter what I do and would never judge me harshly." God becomes a marshmallow—all sugar, no nutrition.

In reality, God's love holds us in delight as parents delight in their children. God's love rejoices in us as the Creator rejoices in endless variety and hidden mystery. God's love doesn't come out of necessity. Rather, it springs out of the nature of God. Out of love, God holds us accountable for our actions, forgives us when we ask, and is an abiding presence, whether we recognize it or not. When we turn away, God is there. When we suffer, God walks with us. When we sin, God is the source of our conversion.

God grounds us in peace and joy. God doesn't love us because we're the greatest and best. If that were the case, none of us would be worthy. God simply loves. We have only to seek his righteousness to know that and believe it.

## **Living Lent Attentively and Gently**

by sending money, clothing or supplies.

Lent is the most important time of the year to nurture our inner life. It is the time during which we not only prepare ourselves to celebrate the mystery of the death and resurrection of Jesus, but also the death and resurrection that constantly takes place within us. Life is a continuing process of the death of the old and the familiar, and being reborn again into a new hope, a new trust, and a new love. The death and resurrection of Jesus therefore is not just an historical event that took place a long time ago, but an inner event that takes place in our heart when we are willing to be attentive to it.

Lent offers a beautiful opportunity to discover the mystery of Christ within us. It is a gentle but also demanding time. It is a time of solitude but also community, it is a time of listening to the voice within, but also a time of paying attention to other people's needs. It is a time to continuously make the passage to new inner life as well as to life with those around us.

When we live Lent attentively and gently, then Easter can truly be a celebration during which the full proclamation of the risen Christ will reverberate into the deepest place of our being.

## **LENTEN NOTES -** Do you know....

The weekdays of Lent are a time of penance for the Church around the world. Fulfillment of this duty involves prayer, works of piety and charity, and self-denial by fulfilling one's obligations more faithfully.

In the Roman rite, including Canada, Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and abstinence from meat.

The law of abstinence from meat binds those who are 14 and older; the law of fasting binds those from 18 to 59 years of age.

- •Purple is the colour of this liturgical season.
- •Flowers are not used to decorate the altar or the area around it throughout the season (GIRM, no. 305).
- •Musical instruments are used only to give necessary support to singing, not for solo playing (GIRM, no. 313).
- •The "Glory to God" is omitted
- •The Gospel Acclamation is "Praise and honour to you, Lord Jesus Christ"

## What is the World Day of Prayer?

The World Day of Prayer is a global ecumenical movement that brings Christians of many traditions together to observe a common day of prayer each year.

Through preparation and participation in the worship service, we can come to know how our sisters of other countries, languages and cultures understand the Biblical passages in their context.

We can hear their concerns and needs and can feel ourselves in solidarity with them as we pray with and for them. In this way, it is possible to enrich our Christian faith, as it grows deeper and broader in an international, ecumenical expression.

The motto of the World Day of Prayer movement is *Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action*. Through our participation in the World Day of Prayer, we affirm that prayer and action are inseparable and that both have immeasurable influence on the world.

## World Day of Prayer in Canada

The World Day of Prayer began in the 19th century when Christian women of Canada and the United States started to be involved in missions at home and in other parts of the world.

Since 1812, women have encouraged one another to engage in personal prayer and take leadership in communal prayer within their mission auxiliaries and associations. Presbyterian women in the United States then called for a national day of prayer in 1887, and Anglican women in Canada established a national day of corporate intercessions for mission in 1895.

On October 19, 1918, Presbyterian women in Canada called together representatives of five Women's Missionary Boards – Anglican, Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian – "to promote the spreading of Christ's kingdom through united prayer and action." That first inter-church meeting gave birth to the Interim Committee on the Federation of the Women's Missionary Society Boards of Canada, which organized a national and inter denominational day of prayer on January 9, 1920.

In 1922, the Canadian committee agreed to use the same theme and day for the Day of Prayer as U.S. women. This annual event became the Women's World Day of Prayer in 1927.

In 1969, The World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations decided to change their international day of prayer from March to May in order to take part in the World Day of Prayer. While this program began with women, it is for all Christians: women, men and children, called to come together in prayer and unity.

Fast food was first created to serve a need - it was a convenient way to feed people who were too busy to prepare quality meals for themselves. Fast food generally isn't very healthy or nutritious, and it was never meant to be a substitute for home-cooked meals, but because of advertising it has become the food of choice for some people. Many children would rather eat out at a fast-food place than eat quality home cooking at their own dinner table!

- Why are many teenagers willing to be brainwashed into believing obviously false advertising?
- How can teenagers see what is true when much time and money are spent promoting what is false?

Flowers need a balanced ecology in order to thrive. God has done a wonderful job of creating the earth, but human beings have sometimes done a poor job as stewards. When we pay more attention to advertising and products and having "the right look," we end up neglecting things that really matter. Many factories and industries are hurting the environment.

- The environment has no voice of its own. How can you be its voice?
- How are consumerism and materialism related to the destruction of the plant? How are teenagers partially responsible?

**RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)** is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

**Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church.** If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
