RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)

is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus.

If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are nonbaptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.

Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.



Sharpening Our Vision By Paige Byrne Shortal

In the Gospel passage about the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, Jesus appears to Cleopas and an unnamed disciple. The audience knows it's Jesus, but the disciples are "prevented from recognizing him."

The disciples tell Jesus about his own death. They talk about their dashed hopes and disappointments. They talk about the women who claim they saw a vision of angels announcing he is alive. Only after they sit down for supper, when Jesus blesses the bread and shares it with them, do they know who he is. The disciples didn't recognize their good friend and teacher, just as we often fail to recognize that divine spark in those we love the most.

An incident that brought this home occurred one evening when our pastor came over for dinner. Our sons ere teenagers then. Remembering the state of their room, I cringed as they gave the priest a tour of the house. When our pastor cam back downstairs, he went on and on about their "cool room."

Later that evening I climbed the stairs to the "lair" to try [to] see what our pastor saw. There it was – every inch of space on the walls and sloped ceilings was covered with original drawings, handcalligraphed quotes, poetry, origami animals, and photographs. It was a cool room. All I had ever seen were the unmade beds and laundry on the floor.

May we all need to take a seven-mile hike together, or at least sit down for a meal and offer up a little prayer for better eyesight – eyes that see Jesus dwelling in each other.

Catechism Theme: True God and True Man (CCC 464-469)

As the apostles began to preach to a non-Jewish audience, they entered a different cultural world. Where the official myths had very little meaning. Where people thirsted for new, radically different spiritualities. And where people argued philosophy as daily entertainment. This environment provided futile ground for evangelization. Within several generations, "Jesus of Nazareth" was a common household name in the urban areas of the Roman Empire.

People not only hungered for stories that told them WHO Jesus was. They also asked WHAT Jesus was. How did Jesus reveal the presence of God on earth? Was Jesus really a man? Something greater? Or, something different?

Some called Jesus a heavenly messenger, who just appeared to be a man. Others said Jesus was God by adoption, so he was just a creature like other men. Still others affirmed Jesus was truly God who became something new when he became a man; in this sense, Jesus was superhuman. Along the same lines, others held Jesus was truly God who took upon himself a human "shell;" Jesus had a real human body, but his inner reality (mind, heart, will, spirit) were truly God. There were so many opinions the Church had to clarify the faith through the declaration of dogma.

The Church holds that the Son of God is a person, distinct and unique, just as we are individual persons, unique and distinct from each other. This person possesses abilities to choose, to love, to act, just as we do. However, the abilities of the Son of God are limitless because he has a complete divine nature (he cannot be partially God, for limiting the unlimited is a contradiction in terms). With a divine nature, the Son of God is truly God.

When the Son of God was born into the world, he made the deliberate choice to limit his abilities as a human person. This is not a contradiction, for the limitations placed upon the unlimited were not imposed by nature, but made by free choice. And the choice was love. T he Son of God took upon himself all the limitations of human nature, so he could show the world the infinite depth of God's love. God's Son became "Jesus of Nazareth" to reveal his love, to offer that love, and invite humanity into a love relationship. For the sake of love, Jesus of Nazareth was truly man.

Jesus' whole life was about service. Since Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life, service is the way to truth and to life. They appointed Stephen and six others to concentrate on service to the community's needs.
