A Reflection by Deacon Dave Hudy

Dear Friends:

Our readings today call us to be aware of God's mercy and to pass that mercy on to others. Our second reading is from Revelation and it's a beautiful witness of God's love for us. John reminds us of Jesus' great sacrifice in leaving heaven to join us here on earth. God coming down to the level of the people and gently wiping every tear from the eyes of the people was not something that the people would have expected. The people of Israel were not that far removed from offering sacrifices, even human sacrifices to try and appease the gods. People in neigbouring countries were even more resigned to the idea that their lot in life was to exist to please the gods. But, in this passage from Revelation, John tells us that God is treating the people with gentleness, coming down from the paradise of heaven in order to comfort the people and erase the evil effects of death.

In our gospel from the book of John, Jesus carries on with the theme of mercy! And he issues a challenge to us. Jesus calls on *us* to carry on the giving of mercy. We have received an unfathomable dose of mercy from Jesus, now he is calling on us to pass on some of that mercy to others. That's what being a Christian is all about! Pope Francis once said that "The mission Jesus received from the Father was that of revealing the mystery of divine love in its fullness. God is love". Everything about Jesus speaks about mercy and compassion. How can we claim to be his followers if we do not do the same? And now for the challenge that Jesus gives us. In our gospel he makes it known that he wants us to live in such a way that others will not have to be told we are Christians. They will simply be able to tell we are Christians by observing us! I don't know about you, but to me that seems like a pretty tall order! Is my life proof of my faith?

When it's difficult to show mercy to others, it helps to think about the mercy that Jesus has shown to us as explained to us in the second reading. Each Mass that we attend should remind us of that mercy! When we receive communion it's good to thank him for what he's done and ask him to help us better understand the mercy that he's shown us and how we can pass that mercy on to others.

Catechism Theme: General Ministry of the Church (934-943)

There are two types of ministry in the Church: a general ministry all Christians are called to and a specific ministry individual members within the Church are called to. The general ministry is to serve the world. The specific ministry is to serve the members of the Church in the name and person of Jesus. These specific or "sacred" ministers who serve the Church (bishops, priests, and deacons) are called "clerics." All other Church members are called "laity." (934, 935)

The three aspects of general ministry are the roles of priest, prophet, and king. As priests, all Christians are called to pray. As prophets, all Christians are called to witness for Jesus through their words and actions. As kings, all Christians are called to lead others as Jesus did, through loving service. (941, 942, 943)

All Christians are called to witness by example. The example of prayer, word and deed, and loving service.

How has the love of Christians help you through times of testing? How did these Christians express their love?

Jesus gave an example of God's presence in the world. We are to continue that example. The love Jesus gives us is the same love we share with others. That love defines us and motivates us. It is the love that grows beyond words.

Reflect on ways you can show God's love to others. Plan two or three ways to share his love this week.

Tending to the Tension

The world appears to be increasingly polarized, a condition that seems to have entered every aspect of life. For example, the rich and the poor still exist, but the gap between them is greater, and the middle class is disappearing. Polarization is found not only in the financial realm but increasingly in politics, business, family relationships, and even in the Church.

Polarization is based on conflict and division. It is an overemphasis on the differences between people at the expense of the unity that makes us who we are as a community. The end result is radical individualism.

This, however, is not how the Church is supposed to be. We are not only called to have a personal relationship with God but a unifying relationship with one another. Although tension does exist, it can be beneficial. Diversity devoid of division and unity without blind conformity allow us to grow without sacrificing fidelity. There is only one way to accomplish this healthy tension—the answer is through Jesus Christ.

If I recognize that I am not God, that I don't have all the answers, and that I don't set the standard by which the world is measured, I must begin to seek answers outside myself. I soon realize that other people in the world have different gifts, talents, views, and personalities. In an effort to understand and relate to this diversity, I am pushed to find some standard by which to measure reality. Some conclude that such a standard doesn't exist and enter into a form of individual or cultural relativism. However, if we look to Jesus Christ and acknowledge him as the true Son of God, then we see we do have a standard who provides a unifying factor in the midst of diversity—Christ.

Therefore, in an ecumenical dialogue (a conversation among Christians), the belief that Jesus Christ is the Messiah is the commonality in the discussion. By acknowledging who Jesus is, we recognize all Christians are brothers and sisters in Christ. This creates the possibility for an environment of mutual respect and dignity. Although we may not agree, we can actively listen, continuously learn, and strive together to discover the truth within the fullness of the revelation of Jesus. Looking to Jesus for the answers we need in our world lays a foundation on which people of goodwill can exist in a healthy tension that seeks truth, allowing us to build community. The various gifts that each has to offer should make the community, the body of Christ, reflect evermore. And this elevates individuals. The fullest expression of who we are exists in the midst of a community of people seeking the face of Jesus Christ in all we say and do.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
