A Note from Your Pastor.....

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The question that the Pharisees ask Jesus, "*Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor or not?*", put him in a very difficult situation because if he says "Yes", then the Jewish people will see him as their enemy. But if he says "No", he could be in a dangerous situation because very clearly he denies and is against the Roman governors. It is not a question to say "Yes" or "No", but as we hear in Jesus' answer, "*Give therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's*", Jesus wants to send them, and us as well, a very powerful message.

I would say that in his answer, Jesus recognises that the State has a role but its power is limited and does not replace God. We see this happen during his conversation with Pilate when Jesus says, "*My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here... You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice." (Jn 18.36-38)*

And more than this, when Pilate asks him, "Do you refuse to speak to me? Do you not know that I have power to release you, and power to crucify you?" In return, Jesus answers him, "You would have no power over me unless it had been given you from above; therefore, the one who handed me over to you is guilty of a greater sin." (Jn 19.10-11)

We, as Christians, are citizens of Canada - the country in which we were born or immigrated to (like me). We are grateful to live in this country. We are able to live in a secure and peaceful country. We have freedom of religion, education, medical care, transportation, water, electricity, social benefits and so on... As citizens of this great democracy, we must respect its laws and rulers. We must be responsible citizens and play our part in making this country the best country for ourselves and others.

However, we are also citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven. To it we also have obligations. What Jesus says in today's Gospel is only a principle. In practice it is not easy to say "this is for Caesar" or "this is for God".

What can you give to God that belongs to Him? Your time, your love, your enthusiasm. And remember to give these things to God when you are interacting with your sisters and brothers because God is dwelling in them. We are called to live in unity and in communion with one another.

Every Sunday each of us professes "*I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth...*" Yes, it is God in whom we believe, who is Creator of the universe and Lord of all. Therefore, we give God something that we do not give to any rulers on earth. That is worship. Sadly, in practice, we don't always put God first in our lives.

There is only one God and we worship only Him, and we are called to obey and practice what he teaches us through Jesus Christ. *"Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him."* (Mt 4.10)

We have to fulfill our duties as citizens, but we also need to acknowledge that we belong to God's Kingdom. We have to fulfill our duties there, as well. When we contribute to this country, we are reminded that we also need to fulfill our duties as citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven by putting God first, worshipping God, building the Kingdom of Heaven here on earth, and bringing unity, love and joy to those around us.

Let us pray to acknowledge that our first and deepest loyalty is to God. To God alone we worship but in the other things we acknowledge and serve the secular powers. Let us pray that those who lead our country will rule wisely and justly and continue to bring peace and harmony to our lives.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)

is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience. The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.

Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.

Our Divine Mark By Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

Have you ever wondered why so many ancient busts of emperors and gods still exist? In any major museum around the world, you'll see rows of these masterful sculptures. The Vatican Museums have one of the best of these collections.

Thousands of busts and statues of the emperors and gods were produced for civil use in ancient times. Just like the American president's portrait is in every US embassy, so Caesar's sculpted form was all over the Roman Empire. For example, a bust would be placed in the town squares of the outlying territories to indicate that a border population belonged to the Roman Empire. The sculptures of Roman gods were also set up in public places around town so that a certain religious unity was preserved. Being within the empire obliged citizens to pay tributes and taxes, and it assured them of protection. Once the Caesars declared themselves divine, their statue also required sacrifice and worship.

The image of the Caesar marked what belonged to him: from land, to money, to people, to prayer. If you were under his image, you belonged to him. We also carry the mark of a divine image that indicates to whom we belong. Each human being is made in the image of God, to be his reflection. We are sculpted and formed to reflect the artist who made us. God gives humans dignity because we are an eternal reflection of God's free, intelligent, artful, and beautiful nature. Our inalienable rights, rooted in our spiritual and rational nature, come from our Creator, as do our duties. No one can take them away.

It is proper to render unto Caesar what is his, but both Caesar and his subjects must render to God what belongs to God.

Your St. Gerard Parish COVID-19 Questions Answered

On March 18, 2020, Archbishop Donald Bolen, in keeping with the Code of Canon Law no. 87, granted to all the Catholic faithful dispensation from their Sunday obligation. <u>This is still in effect</u>.

What does this mean? As Roman Catholics, we have an obligation to attend Sunday Mass. Until further notice, Archbishop Don has granted an exemption from this obligation. For those who are unable or choose not to attend Sunday Mass at this time, you do not have to. Other ways to participate in Sunday Mass is to watch it on television or watch the YouTube Mass online, courtesy of Resurrection Parish & Christ the King Parish (Regina) and the Archdiocese of Regina.

Why do I need to wear a mask? All those who attend both daily and Saturday/Sunday Masses are asked to wear a mask. The parish has a small supply of masks for those who do not have one. Please remember to put your mask on before exiting your vehicle prior to entering the church. A mask protects you and others!

Why do I need to register each time that I arrive to attend Mass? In the event that someone who has attend Mass develops COVID-19, it is necessary for the parish to have the names and phone numbers of all in attendance for contact-tracing purposes.

Catechism Theme: Responsibility and Participation (CCC 1913-1917)

In a single question, the opponents of Jesus asked him to choose between the ideal of a religious life separate from the dominant culture or a life so fully immersed in that culture that religious practice and identity are lost. Of course, Jesus chose the middle. Give to God everything, but give Caesar his due. In other words, we should actively participate in the dominant culture for the common good. In this way, our participation becomes an act of Christian charity (and a means of evangelization).

Participation begins with the personal responsibilities of our families, our work, and churches. To the best of our ability, we should extend our participation to the public arena for the good of the society. For their part, government and social institutions should encourage us to serve others. Thus, those in need and society as a whole grows in hope from a citizenry full engaged.

The thread of participation is the common good. Participation is a moral and ethical act that affirms the dignity of each and every human person. Even in those acts which oppose oppressive governments or social institutions, the focus must remain on the good of all.

How have you exercised personal responsibility and participated in public life for the good of others? How have those experiences helped you grow?

The clash between religious separation and cultural accommodation came from a simple coin and the duty to pay a light tax. The symbols of each weighted heavy on the hearts of Jesus' contemporaries. Yet, in their political struggles they forgot God's reason for social engagement and the government of men. The common good.

In these passages, Jesus gave us the freedom to act in the public arena. But, with that freedom came a responsibility. God calls us to act for the good of all. Does America's obsession with personal freedom preclude the common good? Or does it encourage altruistic acts? Let us pray for the latter.

Reflect on the discussion questions above. List plans you have for service. Resolve to work on one plan this week.

- When have you been among the second group those who see that faith is important, who try to live their faith by doing works of service, and who aren't embarrassed by their relationship with God? What do you think Jesus would say to you about this attitude?
- When have you been among the third group those who say that faith is important and yet don't really practice their faith? What do you think Jesus would say to you about this attitude?
