A Note from Your Pastor.....

My dear Sisters and Brothers,

Instead of giving my message for this weekend, I will tell you a story that an elderly woman shared with me when I visited both she and her husband when I was in Moose Jaw. I invite you to read this story, think about it, and reflect on it within your heart. I will try to summarize it with main points:

My husband and I did everything we could for our children. We wanted them to have the things that we didn't have in our time. We bought a house, and we worked hard to be able to keep up with mortgage payments. It was a very hard time as we had to deal with so many challenges. But our children never lacked anything.

Many nights I didn't sleep well because of our children. They had a lot of illness when they were young, but thank God, all were healed.

Sometimes we saw our neighbours going out to the bar, but we hardly ever went out. We saw friends going overseas for their vacations but we never had enough money to do that. We gladly sacrificed these things for our children.

We sent them to good schools. They never lacked money for books or school supplies. They were always well-dressed. We taught them good values. We taught them religion, faith and brought them to church. We prayed with them every night and we tried to be a good example for them.

Our oldest son quit university when he was in his third year and went into business. He works hard and is doing well. He has different businesses, but money has become his god. Sometimes he sends us a couple of bottles of wine at Christmas but we hardly ever see him.

The second one is a teacher, married to a fellow with a big job. They don't believe in having children. They rarely come to see us, though we still get cards from them on Mother's Day or Father's Day.

The third one has three children and seemed to be happily married. But suddenly he left his wife and went to live with a younger woman. He never shows up in our home since that time.

And the last one is still unmarried. He is touring all over the world. He doesn't believe in working or settling down. The last time that we heard from him, he was somewhere in China.

Then she continued: none of them ever go to church. Now what more could we have done for them? Do we deserve to be treated like this?

We were silent for a while after she finished her story. I didn't say anything. I had no words because I could see how broken-hearted she was.

I was thinking: they are heartbroken parents because they see their children abandoning the faith and adopting a lifestyle which they do not agree with. It is only natural and easy for me to see how their children take everything for granted.

What hurt them the most was the ingratitude of their children, and the way that their children had turned out. They are sad for themselves but I would say that they are even sadder for their children.

Today the first reading, and the Gospel as well, suggest that we should reflect on God's feelings, "What more was there to do for my vineyard that I have not done in it? When I expected it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?" (Isaiah 5.3). In spite of all the love he showed to his people of Israel, all he got in return was utter ingratitude.

The people of Israel had been treated in an advantaged way by God, but advantage brings responsibility. They failed God. God is not disappointed for his own sake, but rather he is disappointed because his people have wasted the blessings that he wanted them to enjoy.

The Christian community is the vineyard that Christ planted. He gave his life for it with such care. Now He is waiting for us, as his followers, the tenants of his vineyard, to produce the fruits of justice, love and peace.

God wants us to make use of all the gifts and opportunities He has given to us so that we can grow as His children. "The Glory of God is a human being fully alive" (St. Irenaeus) but we often fail to respond to His love. And yet God doesn't write us off but He gives us chance after chance.

Thanksgiving is coming! We are invited to count our own blessings we have received and do our best to produce the fruits of what we received, because if not, as Jesus says in the Gospel, "The Kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom" (Matthew 21.43).

My dear Sisters and Brothers, we should take time to think about it.


Do you have a child who is in Grade 2? Or an older child who has not received the sacraments?

The Fruit God Expects

The Chosen People were often compared to a garden or vineyard that God had planted and cared for. First, he placed them in the Garden of Eden. Then he led them to flourish in Egypt before accommodating them in the Promised Land. After all his care and cultivation, he expected to find a fruitful return. In the Song of Songs and then with Jesus himself, not only are the people of God compared to a vineyard, but each of our souls is compared to a vineyard where God plants seeds, waters, and expects to find new growth by thirty-, sixty-, or one hundredfold.

In the image of the Chosen People, the Church, or our souls, one thing is constant: God expects a return on his love. Not because he is selfish and in need of our response but because he knows our happiness depends on receiving and showing him that love.

Jesus says the vineyard will be taken away from those who don't care for it and given to those who will produce its fruit. In the same way, grace will be directed away from some and toward those who accept it and produce faith and love.

This is not a threat or "Catholic guilt." This is a true Father letting his children know he loves them too much to not take them seriously. He gives and gives for our growth and maturing, but if that generosity isn't sincerely embraced and appreciated, we will miss out on the true love of God. Now is the time to accept his love and enjoy the fruits.

Your St. Gerard Parish COVID-19 Questions Answered

On March 18, 2020, Archbishop Donald Bolen, in keeping with the Code of Canon Law no. 87, granted to all the Catholic faithful dispensation from their Sunday obligation. This is still in effect.

What does this mean? As Roman Catholics, we have an obligation to attend Sunday Mass. Until further notice, Archbishop Don has granted an exemption from this obligation. For those who are unable or choose not to attend Sunday Mass at this time, you do not have to. Other ways to participate in Sunday Mass is to watch it on television or watch the YouTube Mass online, courtesy of Resurrection Parish & Christ the King Parish (Regina) and the Archdiocese of Regina.

Why do I need to wear a mask? All those who attend both daily and Saturday/Sunday Masses are asked to wear a mask. The parish has a small supply of masks for those who do not have one. Please remember to put your mask on before exiting your vehicle prior to entering the church.

Why do I need to register each time that I arrive to attend Mass? In the event that someone who has attend Mass develops COVID-19, it is necessary for the parish to have the names and phone numbers of all in attendance for contact-tracing purposes.

"Jesus, the Cornerstone"

This Week...

The vineyard story in Isaiah compliments the vineyard story in Matthew. In the first story, God cares for a vineyard, and the fruit (the people) is not sweet but bitter. In the Gospel, God cares for a vineyard, but at harvest time the farmers kill the vineyard owner's son (Jesus). Jesus reminds the listeners that this story echoes Psalm 188, which proclaims the value of the rejected cornerstone. Paul urges us to live according to what we have learned and accepted, in order to be less anxious and more at peace with God.

For Your Reflection

This parable couldn't be more obvious. The vineyard owner's son is killed by the tenants, so then the vineyard owner will lease the vineyard to different people who will care for the grapes in an honest and respectable way, in memory of his son who died. Jesus switches symbols from grapes to bricks, and then emphasizes how the cornerstone is the very stone that was initially rejected by the builders of the structure. Jesus challenges us to look deeply into this symbolism.

- Who are the rejected bricks and stones at your school? Are there any outcast students who are mocked by others? Why are certain people judged to be more popular or less popular than others?
- That would Jesus say about the value of less-popular individuals?
- How would your reaction to them be different if you took this Gospel message seriously?

 Are you going to change your reaction to them? Why or why not?
- Who are the newer people that lease the land and help to harvest the grapes? Are you in this category?
- Who are the tenant farmers? Who are the builders who dislike the cornerstone? Are you in this category?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
